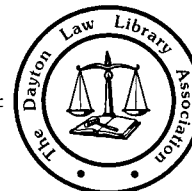

Dear Patrons of The Dayton Law Library:

Even in this era of digital content and electronic law, the concise and condensed treatments of legal topics provided by treatises and handbooks retain their popularity. The ever-increasing ocean of primary source materials has heightened the need for clear and direct means in identifying relevant laws and mandatory procedures. Books remain the mainstay of the Law Library; however, to the detriment of the Association, they are both portable and pricey.

At the recently held Annual Meeting of the Association's membership, the Board of Trustees discussed at length the growing problem of "missing" books. Items that are unaccounted for because they are not in the Library and have not been charged out present problems for patrons who become frustrated by a lack of materials and reduce our financial resources because of replacement costs.

The Librarian and her staff offer to patrons an extremely liberal borrowing policy. Requests for extensions on circulation periods are almost always granted. The books have been bar coded in order to speed up the circulation process and to improve control over the borrowed material. Even with such improvements, still titles are reported as "missing."

The options considered by the Board for alleviating this situation include the suspension of after-hours access, placing security strips on books and periodicals, and to restrict the use of frequently replaced items by configuring a "reserve room" wherein books are charged out before being removed from the shelves. None of these options are appealing and all of them certainly diminish the collegiality of our membership Library.

Before any of these actions are taken, I want to personally ask for the cooperation of all our patrons in abiding by the circulation procedures that require materials to be properly charged out before being removed from the Library. The maintenance of our quality research facility depends upon the honorable and ethical use by the members of our legal community.

I sincerely thank you all for your cooperation.

Changes in Patron Services

Please notice that the printer attached to the workstations in the media center has been relocated to the circulation desk. Printouts are 20 cents per page and may be paid for when they are retrieved from the printer. At no cost, documents retrieved from the LEXIS or WESTLAW databases may be faxed or emailed to a remote location from each workstation.

Diskettes for downloading materials are obtainable at the circulation desk for a cost of 25 cents per disk. In order to reduce virus infections, new disks must be used for downloading.

In addition, the photocopy machine at the circulation desk is available for patron use in the "vend" mode only. Copies are 20 cents each and the vend unit will accept one dollar bills and five dollar bills, as well as nickels, dimes, and quarters. In order to reduce misprints, please ask for assistance at the circulation desk before copying if any of the machine's special features are to be used. A "Statement of Copies Made" slip will be prepared for patrons desiring some form of receipt.
